Message from President David J. Fike

Upon approval from the Board of Trustees, on Monday, May 18, 2009 Marygrove College took ownership of the former Immaculata High School, located on the east side

of the College's property, which most recently housed Bates Academy.

According to **Sr. Janet Ryan**, a member of the Sisters, Servants of the Immaculate Heart of Mary Leadership Council and Vice Chair of the Marygrove College Board of Trustees, Immaculata was built in 1941 "out of a deep concern by Cardinal Edward Mooney that Northwest Detroit did not have a Catholic all-girls high school. The IHMs were more than willing to help fill this void because of our commitment to education and belief that 'when you educate a woman, you educate an entire family.'"

Immaculata thrived for the next few decades, with its enrollment peaking at more than 1,000 students. In the late 1960s, however, as a result of a significant number of Catholics moving out of the city, the school began to struggle. For the next fifteen years the IHMs labored to keep the school open, but increased competition and the

defeat of Proposal C created an insurmountable challenge. In 1983, the IHMs were forced to close the doors on their once thriving gem. The Detroit Public Schools purchased the building in 1992 to open Bates Academy, a K-8 school for gifted and talented students. Bates Academy relocated to the former site of Beaubien Middle



School on Wyoming Ave. in 2007 and the building has been vacant since.

We are extremely pleased that

Immaculata has come back home. The Immaculata purchase is important because now the College has secured the potential for future renovation to support program growth and, of course, the historical significance is invaluable.

The Office of Institutional Advancement, under the leadership of **Mr. Ken Malecke**, has already been in the process of designing and implementing important fund development plans, and campus stakeholders have begun the planning process for the site's future use. Further details about planning for the next phases of this project will be forthcoming.

Marygrove Partners with Oakland University

Marygrove College and Oakland University (OU) recently announced a partnership to enroll students into an accelerated second-degree nursing program which begins Fall 2009.

Because of the national nursing shortage, many qualified nursing program applicants are placed on waiting lists that can be years long. This innovative collaboration offers students the opportunity to immediately begin study at Marygrove College and guarantees that qualified students will be placed in OU's nursing program without a wait, essentially accelerating the pace at which students can become registered nurses.

"This partnership is attractive from many perspectives," said **Dr. Sally Welch**, co-chair, Science and Mathematics Department, Marygrove College. "But perhaps the best part is that students can more quickly complete the training needed to begin careers in the highly paid, in-demand nursing profession."

Students enter Marygrove College and earn a Bachelor of Science degree in Health Science. Marygrove's program contains all the prerequisites for OU's nursing program. For students who successfully complete the Health Science program at Marygrove, OU guarantees placement into an accelerated one-year program of study leading to a Bachelor of Science in Nursing. Once completed, students will become registered nurses (upon successful completion of the NCLEX-RN exam) with two degrees: a Bachelor of Science degree in Health Science from Marygrove College and a Bachelor of Science in Nursing degree from Oakland University.

The program qualifies for **No Worker Left Behind funding**, which provides up to \$5,000 per year in grant aid.

New Pharmacy Tech Program Offered—Qualifies for No Worker Left Behind Funding for Displaced Workers

Marygrove is offering a new program in fall 2009 that will prepare students to become Pharmacy Technicians. Students who complete the program and pass the Pharmacy Technician Certification Exam, will be qualified to work in pharmacies across Michigan as licensed Pharmacy Technicians.

"Employment of Pharmacy Technicians is expected to increase by 32 percent from 2006-2016, which is much faster than the average for all occupations," said **Dr. Sally Welch**, co-chair, Science and Mathematics Department, Marygrove College. "Within one year, students can complete the training needed to begin careers in this in-demand profession. This is especially important for displaced workers who need to quickly retrain themselves."



Marygrove's Make the Grade and Transfer Advantage financial aid programs—which guarantee qualified high-need students can meet tuition costs without student loans—have been extended to include students in this new program. In addition, the program qualifies for the State of Michigan's No Worker Left Behind program, which is targeted to dislocated workers (people who are laid off) and/or students from low income families. The program provides up to \$5,000 per year in grant aid (money that does not need to be repaid) for up to two years to students who have financial need left after other forms of financial aid have been exhausted.

Detroit Science Center Collaboration Offers Two New Science Courses

In spring 2009, Marygrove College and the Detroit Science Center began a partnership to offer graduate courses in science for educators. Classes include a combination of on-site and online learning, and are designed to fit state mandated, continuing education requirements for K-12 teachers. The courses provide variable credit options to suit individuals' specific needs and help teachers with innovative ways to teach students about math and science.

"This is an exciting opportunity for both institutions to help educators gain a better understanding of science with the kind of hands-on experiences other colleges in the area do not offer," said **Julie Johnson**, Associate Director of Education Programs, Detroit Science Center. "We believe the educators going through this program will be given an advantage not only in the general science methods classes, but also in how to incorporate other resources—such as cultural

institutions, into their curriculum."

Senior Leadership Team Adds Two Vice Presidents

After careful consideration, Marygrove College decided to reorganize the Provost position's responsibilities (left vacant upon Dr. Edward Thompson, III's departure) under two Vice Presidents. The reasons in favor of the reorganization fell into three general categories:

1. To provide more focused attention by senior administration on vital areas of importance to the College.
2. To create a "flatter, more responsive" organizational structure.
3. To improve capacity for succession planning related to senior level positions and to provide career advancement opportunities within the College.

Jane Hammang-Buhl '68 was named Vice President for Academic Affairs (VPAA) in May 2009. The VPAA serves as the Chief Academic Officer and Instructional Leader for the College. Reporting to the President, the VPAA provides leadership for advancing the



academic mission and implementing the strategic objectives of the College, including achieving its urban leadership vision. The VPAA is responsible for providing leadership and oversight of the academic affairs division and providing essential leadership to senior-level governance of the College, serving on the President's Cabinet, Committees of the Board of Trustees, as well as selected budget and special committees on the campus.

"Considering my involvement with Marygrove from student to Vice President for Academic Affairs provides many reflective moments for me," said Hammang-Buhl. "I am deeply committed to the mission and belief statements of our sponsors, the IHM Sisters, and I'm excited about working with all of my colleagues to achieve the goals of the 2010-2013 strategic plan. Our vision of urban leadership excites the College community and is encouraging fresh and imaginative expressions of our long-

standing commitment to social justice. It's an amazing blessing to be a part of this committed community."

In President Fike's announcement of the appointment to faculty and staff he said, "I am confident that Ms. Hammang-Buhl's experiences and perspectives gained as a Marygrove College student, alumna, faculty member, department chair, dean and faculty assembly president will serve the institution well. She has considerable knowledge of Marygrove's existing academic programs, policies, procedures and history. I also agree with the feedback from the campus community which describes Ms. Hammang-Buhl as a leader who 'is well read...thinks systematically...communicates well with respect and confidence...is able to foster strong collaboration among different constituencies...focuses on empowerment and accountability...is an excellent listener...and is always professional.'"

Darrin Rankin, Ph.D. was selected for the position of Vice President for Student Affairs and Enrollment Management (VPSAEM). Reporting to the president, the VPSAEM serves as both Chief Student Affairs Officer



and Chief Enrollment Management Officer for Marygrove College. Dr. Rankin is responsible for providing leadership to recruitment, retention, co-curricular programs and enrollment-related administrative services at Marygrove College.

Dr. Rankin comes to Marygrove with 20 years of higher education leadership experience in enrollment and student development. Throughout most of his career, he has served urban universities and has demonstrated a strong commitment to addressing the educational, personal development, and enrollment-related needs of students. He also has a passion for assuring access and success for first-generation college students and students from communities traditionally under-represented in higher education.

Of Dr. Rankin, President Fike said, "...we have been engaged in the last months in a national search for the VPSAEM. The Search Committee reviewed the credentials of scores of applicants, interviewed nearly a dozen candidates, and arranged for four finalists to conduct extensive day-long campus visits and interviews with multiple constituencies on the Marygrove campus. I am confident that Dr. Rankin will bring exceptionally strong contributions to serving our mission of graduating students with competence, compassion and commitment to a more just and humane world and to accomplishing our strategic vision of fostering urban leadership."

Sr. Mary Cabrini, IHM Memorial Fund Provides Support to Science and Mathematics Department

In February 2009, **Dr. Miriam Mohrhoff Poirier '62** initiated the Sr. Mary Cabrini Memorial Fund in honor of her beloved teacher. **Sister Mary Cabrini (Mary Ellen Hohl), IHM, Ph.D.**, was fondly known by students and family as "SMC." Dr. Poirier describes her as "a brilliant woman, a superb teacher, an innovative scientific researcher, and a dedicated woman of faith who touched many lives with her kindness."

From 1957 to 1972 SMC taught at Marygrove College in the Chemistry Department, first as a faculty member under Dr. George Brewer, and then as Chemistry Department Chair. According to Dr. Poirier, "SMC single-handedly modernized the teaching of chemistry at Marygrove and successfully applied for research funds so her students could experience the excitement of research."

After her first departure from Marygrove, SMC had a brilliant career teaching chemistry in metro Detroit. She also coached science teachers and served as an advisor to USAID and the National Science Foundation. During these years, SMC became a largely self-taught expert in computers and was asked to return to Marygrove in the 1990s to teach computer science courses. Sister Mary Cabrini retired to the Monroe motherhouse in 1997 and passed away in September 2007 at age 84.

To date \$2,970 has been contributed to the Sr. Mary Cabrini Memorial Fund and used to purchase a weather station, spectronic 20 spectrophotometer and a pH meter. The weather station will be incorporated into Marygrove's new integrated science major which was designed to create the next generation of K-8 science teachers. It will also be a welcome addition to the environmental science program, particularly in the area of cumulative air pollution research. The spectronic 20 spectrophotometer will be incorporated into several biology, chemistry and forensic science courses and the pH meter will be used in general chemistry and biochemistry.


